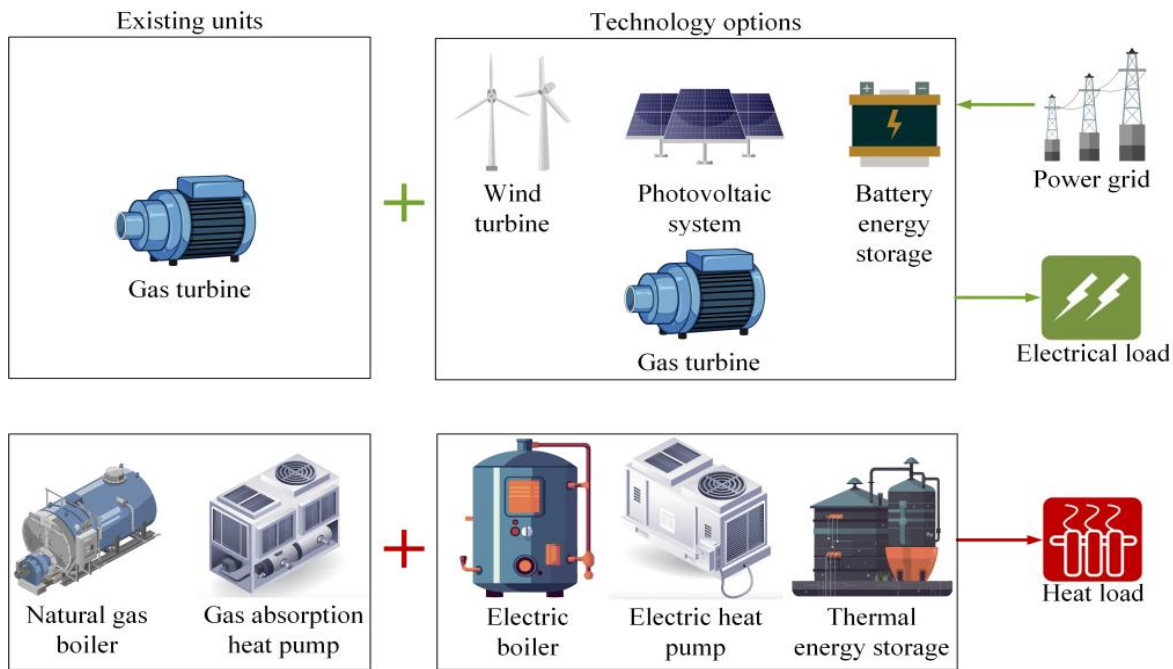


Figure 1: System structure diagram of renewable-integrated oilfield energy system [13]

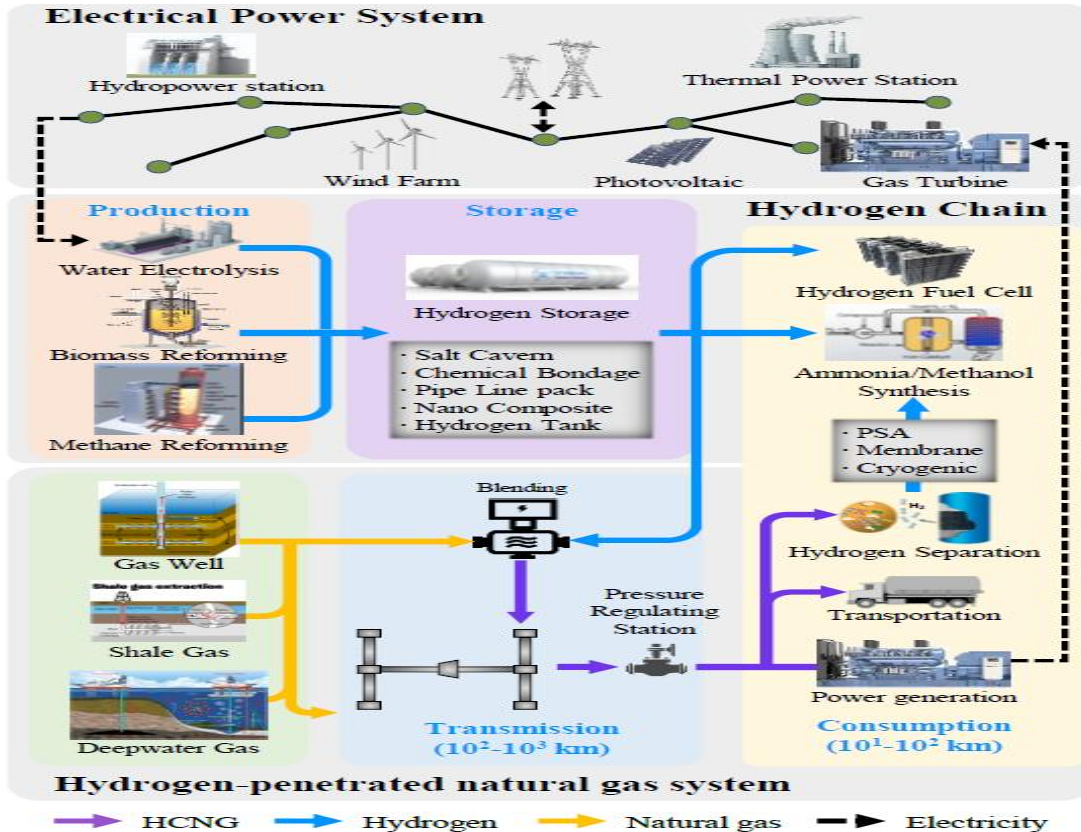


Figure 2: General structure of a hydrogen-blended integrated energy system [4]
